H ot on the heels of good reviews for his sophomore release, "Here, There..." West Orangebased jazz drummer Mauricio de Souza continues to make inroads down here at the Jersey Shore. Tonight, Oct. 29, he's scheduled to perform from 6:30 to 10:30 p.m. at Moonstruck, 517

The Washington Post has called multi-instrumentalist, conductor and composer Amram "one of the most versatile and skilled musicians America has ever produced." The concert will mark the New York premiere of Amram's "Symphonic Variations on a Song by Woody Guthrie," as well as Latin jazz musicians Bobby Sanabria and Candido, John McEuen of the Nitty Gritty Dirt Band, Josh White Jr., Black 47's Larry Kirwan and the Imani Winds.


